

WEAPONS FOUND IN TIBETAN TEMPLES!?

Likewise, I was unable to find anything on BBC and CNN. I was, however, able to find mention of the story on Reuters and the Associated Press (via USA Today).

Most of the hits I've gotten are from Asian news agencies who report that the Chinese **“security authorities turned up 178 guns, 13,013 bullets, 359 swords, 3,504 kilograms of dynamite, 19,360 detonators and two hand grenades”**.² MediaScape has a video of a news broadcast regarding the story as well.³ I've also got various hits from Chinese, Indian and other Eastern news agencies about the story.

⁶ Noam Chomsky noted that in 1969 when Nixon and his Secretary of State Kissenger launched their secret and illegal bombing of Cambodia, the logs of US pilots were falsified to conceal the crime. Between 1969 and 1973, US bombers killed three quarters of a million Cambodian peasants in an attempt to destroy Northern Vietnamese supply bases, many of which did not even exist. During one sixth-month period in 1973, B-52 aircraft dropped more bombs on Cambodians, living mostly in straw huts, than were dropped on Japan during all of the World War 2, the equivalent of five Hiroshimas. ⁷ The Dalai Lama (Tenzin Gyatso) and the Tibetan opposition are funded by the *National Endowment for Democracy* which also funded: the pro-U.S. opposition to Venezuelan president Hugo Chávez; the fascist opposition to former Haitian president Jean-Bertrand Aristide and the opposition to the Cubans. The NED also funded Ronald Reagan's contra war against the Sandinistas in Nicaragua. From 1995 to 2005, the NED gave \$2,047,479 to opposition Tibetan publications, radio stations, organizations and other institutes. Tenzin Gyatso
